In junior high and high school, he took organ lessons with Dr. Hope Davis and for two and a half years also took lessons with Dr. Carol Williams, San Diego's civic organist. He has participated in numerous competitions, including the 2012 Albert Schweitzer Organ Festival, in which he won third prize. Matthew was the organist of the First United Methodist Church of El Centro. He is currently a sophomore majoring in Organ Performance at the University of Alabama, studying with Dr. Faythe Freese, as well as the organist of St. Mark United Methodist Church in Northport, Alabama. In June, he began composition lessons with Dr. Amir Zaheri.
